
DEMOGRAPHICS



PRIORITIES FOR ACTION

- Plan for TNK implementation
- **Process improvements** including referrals to a stroke center, rapid triaging, and clinical assessment
- Advocate for increased rehab time and clinical resources
- How to ensure standards are met while customizing care to meet client needs and preferences (within their family/ social context)
- Support transition back to home/community
- Being focused on **patient-specific meaningful goals** to guide interventions
- Integration of growth mindset into clinical practice; tailor interventions to meet client goals & values
- Consistency in practice & access to evidence-based care
- Ensuring adequate oral health care protocols are in place on our acute and rehabilitation stroke units
- Continue to advocate for proper oral hygiene tools
- Incorporate reactive balance training if not contraindicated to improve confidence and reduce fear of falls
- Community-based support for stroke patients
- Support back to in-person small group peer support programs in our community
- A standard approach for peer support & training
- Review and improve inpatient sessions for peer support groups
- Community-based programs working in one area should be adopted across the province
- Share more tangible programs across the province/country and learn from each other
- Province wide funding for the successful community programs
- Re-examine our transitions from acute to community and see if they are really working for patients
- Provide crucial conversation training to clinical teams
- To learn more about the Crucial Conversations Framework and apply to practice
- Public education and awareness to the patients about anxiety and apathy
- Provide education on anxiety and apathy
- Integration of care, bridging the gap between outpatient and community stroke rehabilitation programs
- More education and awareness of women's health issues around stroke and heart disease both in the general population but also the medical community (e.g., emerg.)
- Create space for conversations about sexuality and intimacy after stroke; embed it in practice like any other required education topic
- More handouts, and more resources to educate staff in acute care and rehab to feel comfortable talking to patients about sex
- Access to community services to support post-acute care after discharge
